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SCHOOL ADMISSION ARRANGEMENTS 2024/2025 DETERMINDED CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION TO LATHOM HIGH SCHOOL

An admission number will be published showing the maximum number of pupils that the school will admit in the Autumn Term 2024. Parents are given the opportunity to express three preferences for a secondary school. Published criteria are used to decide which children should be offered the available places. In secondary schools an equal preference system operates, whereby the three parental preferences are given equal status. Each preference will be considered equally against the admissions criteria.

Our determined admission number is 160.

When a secondary school is oversubscribed the following priorities apply in order:

- 1. Looked after children or a child who was previously looked after, but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangement order, or special guardianship order or those children who appear to the school to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted then
- 2. Children for whom the Governing Body accepts that there are exceptional medical, social or welfare reasons which are directly relevant to the school concerned. (see note i below) then
- 3. Children living within the school's geographical priority area with older brothers or sisters attending the school when the younger child will start, (see note ii below)
- 4. Children living within the school's geographical priority area, then
- 5. Children living outside the school's geographical priority area with older brothers or sisters still attending the school when the younger child will start (see note iii below) then
- Children living outside the school's geographical area (see note iii below)

Making an application

All admission applications should be made via the Lancashire County Council website: www.lancashire.gov.uk

Applications open on 1 September 2023 and close on 31 October 2023 with offers being sent out to parents/carers on 1 March 2024.

In -year admissions

In year admission is the process of applying for a school place during the school year. Any applications for the intake made after the start of the autumn term will be treated as an in-year application. The in-year admission process is managed by the school. Parents are required to complete the in-year application form, which is available from the school website. Where a place cannot be secured, parents will be offered a legal right of appeal to an independent panel. Lancashire County Council administers the appeals process on behalf of the school. Parents can complete the school's appeal form on Lancashire County Council's website.

<u>Notes</u>

- I. The medical, social and welfare criterion will consider issues relevant to the child and/or the family. This category may include children without a statement who have special needs. Children who have a statement for special needs will have their applications considered separately.
- II. Brothers and sisters includes step children, half brothers and sisters, fostered and adopted children living with the same family at the same address (consideration may be given to applying this criterion to full brothers and sisters who reside at different addresses). The priority does not apply to siblings whose brothers and sisters transferred into a sixth form at 16+.
 - Parishes of Lathom South (part of*) and Skelmersdale. *The part of the parish to the north of Spa Lane and Vale Lane.
- III. The distance criterion which will be used as the tie breaker if there is oversubscription within any of the admission criteria is a straight line (radial) measure. If the Governing Body is unable to distinguish between applicants using the published criteria (e.g. twins or same block of flats) places will be offered via a random draw.
 - The distance measure is a straight line (radial) measure, centre of building (home) to centre of building (school)
- IV. A child's permanent address is the one where he/she normally lives and sleeps and goes to school from. Proof of residence may be requested at any time throughout the admission process, (including after a child has accessed a school place).
- V. The Governing Body will keep a waiting list for the school until 31 August 2024. This will be kept in priority order using the school's published admission criteria.
- VI. Children will not normally be able to start school other than at the beginning of the term unless they have moved into the area or there are exceptional circumstances.
- VII. Applications for school places which are received late will not necessarily be dealt with at the same time as those received by the set deadline. The reasons for a late application may be requested and where these are not exceptional the relevant admission criteria will be initially applied to all others received on time. The late application will be dealt with after this process.

VIII. Where a child lives with one parent for part of the week and another for the rest of the week only one address will be accepted for a school admission application. This will normally be the one where the child wakes up for the majority of school days (Monday to Friday). Proof of residence may be requested at any time throughout the admissions process.
